Other Family History:

Parents, Charles Edward Roberts and Harriett Sinden married 16 April 1882 at St Michael and All Angels Church, Marden and lived at Paddock Wood where Charles worked as a Porter for South East. Rail. He worked as a labourer for S.E. Rail when the Hawkhurst Branch Line was being built and then a platelayer at newly erected Horsmonden Station until 1927 when he retired. He travelled by train from Paddock Wood to Horsmonden to work before moving into 5, Station Cottages around 1897 where he lived until he died in 1936.

The following article appeared in the Kent & Sussex Courier, issue Friday 14 Aug. 1936.

HORSMONDEN. "HE HELPED BUILD THE RAILWAY"

Mr. Charles Roberts, of 5 Station Cottages, Horsmonden, who died on Saturday, aged 75, helped to build the railway line at Horsmonden, and was employed as plate-layer at the same station for 45 years. He had been retired from that position about nine years.

The Methodist Church too, will have good cause to miss him, for not only did he fulfil his official duties in his usual thorough way, but his devotion to his church was an outstanding example to others.

Although Mr. Roberts had been ill off and on for the past year, he was walking about till a short time before his death, and was in good spirits when he went to bed on Friday night. His death came as a great shock to his many friends in the village and elsewhere, for his lovable personality and upright character made him one of the most popular of men.

His wife died nine years ago, and a family of four sons and four daughters are bereaved.

Three brothers are on active service – Charles and Harry being in France and William on a destroyer.

Prior Occupation: Sidney worked for Messrs. Smith and Manwaring, farmers at Hale Farm, Horsmonden until he was old enough to join the Army.



Service Records: The Service Records for Private Roberts were destroyed by fire when the Army repository in Wandsworth was hit during a German air raid in 1940 when approximately two thirds of the records were destroyed.

Personal and military notes

He enlisted at Canterbury in 1907 and served in Scotland, Ireland, South Africa and Gibraltar up until 1914 with the 1st and 2nd Battalions, Royal Scots Fusiliers.

The 1911 Census for Military Establishments shows that Sidney was at the aptly named Roberts Heights Garrison, Pretoria, Transvaal, South Africa with the 1st Battalion Royal Scots Fusiliers under the command of Lt. Col. A B H Northcott. (*I below)





After his spell with the 1st Bn. RSF in Pretoria, Sid went to Gibraltar with the 2nd Bn. The 2nd Bn. returned to England in Sept 1914

The Regiment left Gibraltar for England in September 1914 before landing at Zeebrugge 6th October 1914. Pte Roberts saw action on the Western Front and in November 1915 he transferred to the 8th Service Battalion and sent to Salonika (Thessaloniki) where he fought in the Balkan Theatre.

Pte Roberts received a gunshot wound in the abdomen during the disastrous frontal attack against a strongly fortified Bulgarian position known as Pip Ridge in the 3rd Battle of Doiran on the Macedonian front, 18th & 19th September 1918.

He was sent by light rail to Salonika to the 21st Stationary Hospital immediately where on the 19th Sept, he died and was buried the following day.




The 21st Stationary Hospital in Salonika



DIED OF WOUNDS

Pte. S. C. Roberts, Royal Scots Fusiliers, second son of Mr. and Mrs. Roberts, of Station Road, Horsmonden, died of wounds received in action on September 19th. Twenty-eight years of age, he was for four years in the employ of Messrs. Smith and Manwaring and was very popular in the village. In 1907 he joined the Militia at Canterbury, and served in Gibraltar, in Ireland and Scotland, five years in South Africa, two years in Salonica, and over two years in France. He was one of the first to land at Zeebrugge in the early days of September, 1914. Three brothers are on active service – Charles and Harry being in France and William on a destroyer.






SARIGOL MILITARY CEMETERY - KRISTONI, KILKRIS, GREECE

There is a medal Index card for Driver 58939 Roberts, Charles E. Royal Field Artillery, who went to France on 25 Aug 1915, he received 1915 Star, British War and Victory Medals.

His other brother Nelson James Roberts was disabled and unfit for service, he attended Woolsthorpe House home for crippled boys, Wright's Lane, Kensington, in 1911, training as a bootmaker, Nelson died aged 21 and was buried at St Margaret's Church, Horsmonden 4th September 1915

The 1901 census showed Nelson was at 5, Station Cottages in Horsmonden along with parents and siblings Nellie (Ellen), Kate, Sidney, William, Mercy and Ransom Henry (Harry)

Of Sidney's nephews and nieces.

His sister's married names were; Daisy Charlotte HOLNESS, Ellen Kathleen JUDGE/UNDERDOWN, Mercy WOODCOCK, Sarah Agnes Kate WHEATLEY

His brothers William John married Edith Mary Woodcock and Ransom Henry married Nellie Billson.

Older brother Charles Edward Roberts and **Ellen Butchers**, married at St Margaret's, Horsmonden, 19th May, 1908

"Sidney's two-brothers-in-law George and William Butchers, (brothers of Charles's wife Ellen) also fell in the Great War and are commemorated on the War Memorial
