**Relevant Military Record/Service details:** Frederick joined the local Volunteers before enlisting into the 3rd/5th Buffs (East Kent Regiment) on the 22 Sept. 1914 at Ashford, Kent. as Private G/13673 Couchman. He then transferred into the 6th Battalion, The Buffs, on 22nd Sept 1914, declaring that he was previously in the 5/Buffs Territorial Force (Weald of Kent).

Frederick embarked with the British Expeditionary Force for France, landing on the 30th December 1916 and was sent to the Front.

On the day that Sgt Couchman was killed in action during the Battle of the Somme 3rd Oct 1917, the 6th Buffs were in the frontline trenches at the village of **Gueudecourt**, which lies on the Le Sars – Le Transloy road north east of Flers.

**COUCHMAN, FREDERICK WILLIAM,** Sergt., No 13673, 6<sup>th</sup> (Service) Battn. The Buffs (East Kent Regt.) 2<sup>nd</sup> *s* of George Couchman of Tompsett's Farm, Horsmonden, co. Kent, by his wife, Ellen, dau of William King: *b*. Horsmonden aforesaid, 28 March, 1885; educated there; was for a time. A member of the Territorial Force (The Buffs), and on the outbreak of war rejoined voluntarily: Served with the expeditionary Force in France and Flanders, and was killed in action at Arras 3 Oct. 1917. Buried at Monchy-le-Preux. His Commanding Officer wrote: "He was in my platoon, and a splendid fellow, both in and out of the line. It was his willingness to help others that won him the deepest love of both officers and men, and his death is regretted by all; his courage and comradeship will always be remembered by those who have been privileged to serve with him" He married at Horsmonden 22 April 1916, Eva Gertrude (Centre Lodge, Benacre Hall, Wrentham, co. Suffolk) dau. of John Harvey.


#### **Damaged Service Records:**







The War Office Casualty sheets above show that Frederick suffered from Trench Fever in the field on 19th June 1917 and was taken to No. 5 Convalescent Depot at Cayeux-Sur-Mer. From Cayeux he arrived at Etaples on 28th July until his recovery allowed him to rejoin his unit in the field on the 22nd August 1917. Sadly, Frederick was killed in action on 3rd October.

**Additional Personal and Family Information:** Frederick's family background is a long line of agricultural workers who were at Tompsett's Farm in Horsmonden for well over a century.

In 1911 Frederick, aged 24, was living with his parents at Tompsett's Farm and was employed as a Domestic Chauffeur for Bernard Spring-Rice a wealthy business man of Sprivers, Horsmonden.

At this time Eva Gertrude Harvey age 29 was employed by the Spring-Rice family as a live-in cook and it was here the relationship started between Frederick and Eva.

Eva continued in service to Mr & Mrs Spring-Rice after Frederick's death and when they left Sprivers and moved to Glebe House, Burwash, in late 1918/early 1919. Eva went with them and became their senior servant, Cook/Housekeeper. After the death of Mrs Cecily Spring-Rice, Eva stayed on as Housekeeper for Bernard Spring-Rice until he died in 1953. Later that year Eva married William Standing of Burwash at Westminster. She died at Hayfield House in Burwash Common East Sussex October 1970 aged 87.

### Family History: Baptism/Marriage records etc

Frederick took leave prior to being sent to the Front and married Eva Gertrude Harvey on the 22nd April 1916 at St. Margaret's Parish Church, Horsmonden, by which time he had been promoted to Sergeant in the 3/5th Bn. The Buffs, shown in the Parish Marriage Book below ...














# **Cemetery Plan:**

### **Footnotes and Acknowledgements:**

- 1: CWGC quote: "Concerning our spelling of Sergeant: "Serjeant" spelt with a "J" is peculiar to the British and New Zealand armies and is used in connection with those services only. The British army did not change its spelling to "Sergeant" with a "G" until November 1953. As we commemorate those who died during the two world wars only, the "Serjeant" spelling is historically correct. CWG headstones for Sgt's are spelled with 'J'.
- **2:** Frederick will have many relatives, nieces and nephews, and their descendants, including the Barham family of Horsmonden.
- Sgt. Couchman's nephews, Ray, John ("Gongey"), Ted, Eric and Gerald Barham, all played for Horsmonden's football team over a span of several years, also his nieces from the same family, Mildred, Thelma, Enid, Megan and Maureen Barham. Enid Chappell (Barham) lives in Horsmonden with her Husband David. The Barham's were the children of Sgt. Couchman's sister, Dorothy Ada, who married Albert Edward Victor Barham in 1930, and lived at Hoath Meadow before moving to 8 Gibbet Lane.
- Cpl. Albert Maynard, of the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, The Buffs, was the Barham children's Great Uncle, who also fell in WW1 and is commemorated on Horsmonden's War Memorial.
- 3: Sgt Couchman was the Great Uncle of Alan Couchman and the late Sheila Larkin (nee Couchman).
- **4:** There is a query about the birth date of Sgt Couchman: CWGC records show that he was 32 when he was killed.

The De Ruvigny\* says he was born on 28 March 1885. However, the official CRBI record, volume 2a, page 709 gives his birth as the 2nd quarter of 1887 when his birth was registered. Mother's maiden name - King. (Ellen King).

It is possible a clerk in the Army Records office made a transcription error as the official Civil Registration Birth Index records a birth date of 1887 which would make him 30 when he was killed.

\*De Ruvigny's Roll of Honour, 1914-1919 is a data collection containing biographies of over 26,000 casualties of the Great War.

Sergt. F. Couchman, of The Buffs, second son of Mr. and Mrs. Couchman, of Tompsett's Farm, was villed in action at Arras on October 3rd. He was an old Territorial, and joined at the outbreak of war. His Commanding Officer, in a letter to the widow, says that his courage and comradeship, and willingness to help everyone made him universally loved. Private G. E. Couchman, his eldest brother, is a prisoner of war and wounded. Two other brothers are serving.
